

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL EVENT PLANNING

It can be challenging trying to figure out how to get the whole neighborhood together, but it doesn't have to be complicated. Start by figuring out what kind of event you want to host. A block party can be as simple as inviting everyone over to your front yard to make ice cream sundaes and listen to some music.


- **Start early:** Begin planning your event as early as possible. This gives you ample time to arrange everything and tackle unexpected issues.
- **Engage your neighbors:** Foster active participation this step is particularly relevant for organizing larger events. By involving people in the planning process, their commitment to the event's success grows stronger.
- **Communication is key:** Keep everyone informed about the event's details. You can use social media, flyers, or word-of-mouth.

I want to throw a block party, now what?

You know what you want to do, now it is time to set the plans in motion. It is certainly possible to plan the party by yourself, but you may find it beneficial to team up with a couple of other neighbors to get the party planned. Follow these next steps to get your party going.

- 1. <u>Pick a date:</u> Choose a date that works best for your neighbors. Consider weekends, evenings, or holidays when most people are likely to be available.
- 2. <u>Find out if you need permits:</u> If you plan on closing the street or using a public space for your gathering, make sure to check whether permits or permissions are necessary and apply well in advance. Required Materials/Resources: Access to city council or local government website to check for permit requirements. Application forms if applicable.
- 3. <u>Decide on food and drinks:</u> You can opt for potluck style where everyone brings a dish, a casual picnic, or even have the event catered, depending on your budget and preferences. Required Materials/Resources: A list to keep track of what each household is bringing (for potluck). Caterer's contact info (if applicable).
- 4. <u>Plan entertainment:</u> Pick activities that appeal to diverse age groups such as music, games, jump houses, or painting options for the kids. Required Materials/Resources: Entertainment equipment (musical instruments, speakers, game items, painting supplies, etc.)
- 5. <u>Spread the word!</u>: Use word of mouth, flyers, or posters to inform your neighbors about the event. Going door to door also gives you a chance to introduce yourself, gather suggestions, and offers of assistance from those who may be interested in helping. Required Materials/Resources: Paper and printer for flyers/posters. A list to note down suggestions and offers of assistance. Pick a date think about what may work best for your neighbors.

Here are some additional tools you can use!

As you plan your neighborhood gathering, consider using the following additional tools to streamline the process and make the most of your event:

- <u>Online Surveys</u>: Use online survey tools like <u>SurveyMonkey</u> or <u>Google Forms</u> to gather input on dates, event types, food preferences, and more. This can help ensure that your event caters to the majority's interests and is convenient for most attendees.
- <u>Group Chats or Emails:</u> Create a group chat or email thread for your neighborhood. This platform can serve as a forum for sharing updates, reminders, and last-minute changes. Platforms like WhatsApp, GroupMe, or a simple email thread can be effective.
- <u>Shared Online Calendars:</u> Platforms like Google Calendar can help keep everyone on the same page regarding the event date and any pre-event meetings or deadlines.
- <u>Social Media:</u> Use local social media pages or groups to spread the word about the event. You can post updates, photos, and reminders to keep everyone excited and informed.
- <u>Event Management Apps:</u> Consider using an event management app like Evite or <u>Eventbrite</u>, which can handle invitations, RSVPs, and updates all in one place.
- <u>Local Services:</u> Look into local services that could enhance your event. This could mean hiring a local band, sourcing food from a local bakery, or renting games from a local party supply store. Utilizing local services can add a unique touch while supporting local businesses.
- <u>Canva:</u> This online design tool can be extremely useful when planning your neighborhood event. You can design and print out flyers, create online invitations, or even make a banner for social media. With a user-friendly interface and a host of templates, Canva makes creating eye-catching, professional-looking graphics a breeze.

- Record Outcomes: Record the number of participants, document the activities carried out, and capture any noteworthy accomplishments or milestones achieved during the event. These outcomes will help us measure the success of our project and guide future events.
